Bill Marshall, Linda Wenner, and Bruce Spaman represented the Friends at the Capitol this year.

As the Friends' President, I delivered testimony by mail for Raised Bill No. 6482 AN ACT AUTHORIZING BONDING FOR BIKEWAYS, GREENWAYS AND RECREATIONAL TRAILS. I emphasized how financial support from the Recreational Trails Program (RTP) has helped the Friends leverage member support, volunteer labor, and other grants to extend the benefits of our ongoing work for trail users throughout the Forest. Current funding from the RTP program supports the following important projects at Goodwin: trail maintenance, trail reconstruction and erosion amelioration. For the DEEP budget, I emphasized that the current limit of field staff at 83 was far too low and wanted the level increased by 117 back to the staff level in 2000, when park attendance was much less. Lori Brant of DEEP provided us with a laundry list of the sites that comprise the 21,000(!) acres for which Matt Quinn is responsible. You will find a site list in the minutes of the last Friends meeting on our web site.

Please attend our next Friends meeting on May 9 and our <u>open house</u> on May 19.

The trails crew is also making sure that the courses for the upcoming trail run are in perfect shape for the annual trail run. They've done a fabulous job of creating some of the best trails in the state (according to feedback from trails

#### Garden Crew update

We had a garden volunteer orientation in March and have a good crew to help maintain the native plant arboretum, propagation beds and Children's Discovery Trail (CDT). The plan for this season is to keep things tidy, make records of when plants are in bloom (for a future what's in bloom board), remove invasive species (both in the garden and along some trails.) and address issues as they arise.

We've done some fun activities, including building fairy houses (to be positioned on the CDT the first week of June), tool sharpening, and helping finish trophies for the upcoming trail run.

Let us know if you'd like to join in the fun. Most workdays are Tu/Wed but we do have at least one weekend day per month as well as independent volunteer opportunities.

# Native Plant Sale on hiatus

Due to the proliferation of invasive jumping worms, we currently can not responsibly offer plants for sale.

Do you have jumping worms in your garden? woods? lawn?

Currently, there are no solutions to easily get rid of these pests. Right now, they are just beginning to hatch and can be found in the top 4" of your soil. Keep a bucket of soapy or vinegary water with you to drop them in as you dig. Each worm you kill will prevent 90 eggs from being laid.

As new research emerges, we'll keep you posted.
