


WELCOME!

You are on the grounds of the James L. Goodwin Conservation Center. Lying at the southern end of the Goodwin State Forest, the center includes the 83-acre Demonstration Forest where you can see state-of-the-art, professional, forest-and-wildlife-stewardship practices. We invite you to observe these practices on the Forest Discovery Trail with this guide in hand.

James L. Goodwin (1881-1967)

One of the first professional foresters educated in America, James Goodwin owned over 1,700 acres at Pine Acres Farm. Goodwin and his staff practiced cutting-edge forest management her for over 50 years. In 1964 he gave the entire property to the people of the state of Connecticut earmarking the house and surrounding 80 acres as a forest and wildlife education center. Due to Mr. Goodwin's vision and generosity, professional foresters have managed this demonstration forest for over a century.

The Forest Discovery Trail is marked with green arrows. It begins at the sign board across the street from the parking area on Potter Road and continues past the youth camping area at the northwest corner of the center's grounds. The numbers on the posts along the trail correspond to those in the guide.
